I was super disappointed with last year's because that was supposed to be the 35th anniversary calendar. They celebrated 35 years of Sesame by showing us the same set of faux-vintage drawings that were on every other piece of merchandise all year. How about actually opening up the file drawers and finding a cool old Christmas scene?

I think the calendars are suffering from the same tired defeatism that everything is in the Muppet/Sesame world. This is the thought process: "Oh, sure, back in the 70's and 80's, we put a lot of work into the Sesame calendars, but that was when we were selling 2 million calendars a year. But there's much more competition now, and nobody really cares about Sesame Street anymore. We don't make enough money to justify spending any time or money on it. So we just provide some stock photos to a licensee, and they slap something together, and it sells okay. I don't know if we're even going to bother doing a calendar next year at all. Maybe I should just lie down under my desk and take a nap."

I think the franchise is just old and tired now. In the 70's, the calendars and records and books were made by the people who made the show. We've been adding a lot of Sesame books and records to the wiki lately, and I've been struck by how often the same names keep coming up in the credits for *everything*.

In 1974, they made 130 episodes of the show every year -- five times more than they do now. They also put out eleven records that year, and most of those records had extra songs and dialogue that wasn't even from the show. They also put out the Sesame Street ABC Storybook, which had 26 hilarious illustrated stories, all in different styles, and all of it original material. And y'know who's credited as the writers of that storybook? Jeff Moss, Norman Stiles and Daniel Wilcox - who were on the writing staff of the show, and who are also credited on all of those eleven records. Oh, and also they wrote "Rubber Duckie" and invented Grover.

They worked their asses off on that show. Everything was important to them -- the records and the books had to be just as good as the show; it was all part of the same thing. They were young and hungry, and they had something to prove, and most importantly, the creative people were running things.

I can't imagine how many hours Jeff Moss and Joe Mathieu and Frank Oz put into Sesame Street in 1974. You don't work that hard unless you absolutely *love* what you do, and for a creative person to love their job that much, they must have felt like they were part of a huge creative team where everybody's smart and passionate and excited about what they're doing. Nobody slept that year. They were working too hard and having too much fun, and it shows, because the stuff that they produced is hilarious and amazing.

They didn't worry about having to pay the photographer extra to take new pictures for the album covers. They didn't say, hey, this drawing is just for a lunchbox, why don't we just use the one from last year's calendar? The people who were making those decisions were the same people who were writing the songs and performing the puppets. Creative people can't sit by and watch their team produce crap, so they wouldn't allow it.

But that was thirty years ago, and the creative people don't run the company anymore. Now it's run by business types, who cut corners and worry about the cashflow. They approve a 35th anniversary "branding plan" that involves putting the same six pictures on everything, and they think that sounds like a good idea, and then they go home at 5 and forget about it.

And hey, guess what? When you stop putting time and money into making good creative stuff, then the audience drifts away, and you have fewer people buying your calendars and videos. So then the business folks have even less interest in investing time and energy in making good stuff, and it's just a downward spiral from there. Then you end up making bonehead decisions like approving a "branding plan" that involves making Sesame UNO sets and Magic 8-Balls, instead of taking the funniest stuff that you have in your library and putting it on a DVD.

Meanwhile, three of the guys who made all that stuff in the 70's -- Norman Stiles, Mike Frith and Christopher Cerf -- they got frustrated waiting around for the business folks to make bad decisions. So they left in 1996, and they started their own company, and they made Between the Lions. They could've used that energy to make great Sesame stuff. The company doesn't want that energy anymore, so they had to go somewhere else.

It might be possible to turn that ship around, but it means putting the creative people in charge again. In general, the history of the last fifteen years is that the geniuses left the building. Some of them died, some of them retired, and some of them got bored and moved on to other projects. There are still great puppeteers there, bless 'em, but the ones who are still there don't have the authority to make the big decisions.

What they need is a new management team that's young and hungry and creative, and willing to spend some money and take some risks. They need people who know that it's not enough just to sit around and whine about the fact that they've lost market share -- if they want to win people back, they need to make better stuff. I don't know if that'll happen. If it doesn't, then the calendars are just another symptom of the sad, inevitable decline.

We didn't actually have radishes, but we had apples, and we cut them into sticks before we ate them.

The first puppets I made were also Fraggles. I made them out of computer punch cards -- if I taped two of them together at the top and edges, it was the right size for my little-kid hand, and folding the cards created a joint that was the mouth. Now that I think of it, that's how I learned to lip-sync. I wish we'd been able to save a couple of those puppets, but being made of computer cards coloured with crayon and held together with Scotch tape, they disintegrated after a couple of years. (My parents maintain that they were actually made out of tape, held together with computer cards. Ha ha.)

Of course I also watched Sesame Street and The Muppet Show, but Fraggle Rock was the one that was really an influence on my life. I was also a child during the Jim Henson Hour, so there were parts of that show that I didn't understand at all (Living with Dinosaurs), parts I barely remember (Song of the Cloud Forest), and parts that scared the hell out of me (The Food Chain Song).

I did have "Secrets of the Muppets" taped off the TV, and for all of first grade I watched it more or less every day after school. Yes, at the tender age of six, I was saying things like "matte" and "arm wires." Weird kid.

There's probably more, but that's all that comes to mind right now and this post is far too long already.





Jog

One of my favorite creative projects was inventing the character of Jog. I love Jog. I've been writing for him for over seven years, which is about the longest time I ever spent developing a character. He's been around for so long that I'm always comfortable performing him. He is also one of my most elaborate characters. I'm very proud of that.

When I first started performing Jog - I think it was 1998 or so that we Introduced him on Muppet Central - he was only a rough sketch of the Jog we know today. My first idea of this character was that he had to be bilingual and funny. That was mostly his personality in those days. He was not a fully three dimensional character yet.

After a while, I realised that Jog's strength lied in interacting with other characters. The thing that motivates Jog is that he seems to be looking for companionship. That was an important turning point in my interpretation of Jog, and I think I would have stopped performing him if it weren't for that motivation.

He had his own blog for a while. He recorded some musical numbers - I think that was the first time we let him step out of his fictional life by giving him a voice - and he's had some amazing character moments in chatrooms. I've gotten the most wonderful notes from people who like Jog, and I'm still not sure why. I'm still trying to figure out what makes him work.

At one point we decided to give Jog's life a new dimension by letting him appear in the real world as well, alongside some of the Tough Pigs. I got to play the part of Jog, which was a lot of fun to do. I always thought of Jog as a fictional character. I never stopped and wondered what he'd be like as an actual human being. I made him this hyperactive kind of guy, and that seemed to work pretty well in those days. Looking back, I think I would have given him more depth and a bit more of a serious side if I were to do it again.

Due to financial reasons, it was impossible for me to fly over to America and play Jog on a regular basis. He's gone back to being a fictional character now. Nevertheless, there are many things I'd love to do with Jog in the real world, and I think there might be a chance I'll get to realise those ideas in the far away future.

I seem to be putting some of my personal growth into Jog's development. When I started doing him, Jog was a young playful teenager, just like me. He's become a bit more serious and grown-up lately. I'm currently experimenting with giving Jog some gloomier personality traits, because I think that makes him a richer character.

Jog and I are not the same people. Jog can say or do things that I wouldn't dare to come up with. He is a fun outlet for my dreams, and

my frustrations as well. He is what I would like to be. But sometimes I have to remind myself that he and I are two individuals. I'm quite concerned about not letting our two worlds merge too much. It's better for both of us.



Because self-aggrandizement only works if the comparison is both (a) justified and (b) flattering.

Let's take, for example, Nipplegate (a scandal which not only featured no gates, no water and no criminal activity authorized by the executive branch of the government, but was also notable for its complete absence of nipple.)

Story: Brief Clothing Mishap Reveals Existence Of Human Female Breast.

Basic Principles of Media Mathematics: Surprise = Shock, Breast = Sex, Sex = Bad.

Media Mathematics In Action: Surprise Breast = Bad Shock!

MediaGate Principle In Action: "Hey, Fuckhat Subeditor #2. You know what OTHER story involved a shocking and bad revelation? That one story about how Nixon illegally plotted to screw his rivals right royally while sitting inside the actual Oval Office!"

"Great Caesar's Ghost, that's right, Fuckhat Subeditor #1! THAT story had similar implications in constitutional law to this story, inasmuch as this story will allow us to print many, many pictures of Janet Jackson's bazoomas!"
